

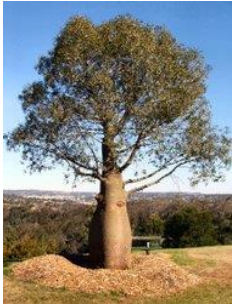
Recommended Trees for Replanting

Trees can be a valuable asset to our homes and environment, however sometimes it is necessary to remove them. Frontier Tree Services are supporters of the Carbon Neutral initiative by replanting trees in rural Australian areas. We encourage our customers to do the same in their homes by replanting with new trees where ever possible.

Below is a list of trees that the Gold Coast City Council generally recommend for replanting in urban/suburban properties. These trees are all natives with non-invasive root systems

My personal favourite and A Queensland native.....

Queensland Bottle Tree (*Brachychiton Rupestris*)



Grows to approx 7m max. They are a great feature tree perfect for the urban environment. Ideal for planting in lawns as they have a tap root (rather than surface roots) which means your lawn does not suffer due to the competition for water
Uses – UNIQUE SPECIMEN TREE



Tuckeroo (*Cupaniopsis Anacardioides*)



A great shade tree with dense canopy. Very hardy (salt tolerant) grows to approx 10m max. White flowers/ orange berries.
Use – SPECIMEN TREE

Golden Penda (*Xanthostemon Reticulates*)



A great shade tree with dense canopy, grows to approx 10m max. Dark green glossy foliage with red new growth. Beautiful golden-yellow flowers loved by the lorikeets!
Use – SPECIMEN TREE

Blueberry Ash (*Elaeocarpis Reticulates*)



Grows to approx 8m max. Small/ narrow growth habit with attractive bronze/ green foliage, and deep green when older. Pink/ white Flowers followed by dark blue fruits that the birds will love.
Use SPECIMEN TREE or SCREEN

Tulip Wood (*Harpullia Pendula*)



Grows to approx 8m max. Small yellow flowers with yellow or red fruits. Ideal for coastal plantings.
Use – SPECIMEN TREE

Lemon-scented Meryll (Backhousia Citriodora)



Grows to 5 metres max. x 4. Deep green foliage with silver undersides. Has creamy, white fluffy clusters of flowers. It is both fragrant and bushy to the ground. Leaves are often used in cooking. Unfortunately susceptible to myrtle rust.
Uses – SPECIMEN TREE, SCREEN, OR MAINTAIN AS SHRUB/ BUSH

Ivory Curl (Buckinghamia Celsissima)



Grows to approx 8m max. Glossy green leaves with white drooping flowers. A hardy compact tree with a dense canopy.
Uses – SPECIMEN TREE

Weeping Lilly Pilly (Waterhousia Floribunda)



Grow to approx 10m max. The new growth can give you orange, red and copper tones all at the same time while the older foliage becomes dark green. Dense canopy, ideal to use as a screen or manage as a hedge.
Uses – HEDGE, SCREEN, OR SPECIMEN TREE

Bottlebrush (Callistemon Eureka)



Grows to approx 8m max. A Tall upright tree/ shrub with masses of hot pink flowers. A real favourite for birds. Often managed as a shrub or hedge. A hardy local favourite
Uses – SCREEN, HEDGE, OR TO FORM PART OF MULTIPLE PLANTINGS

Cascade Lilly Pilly (Syzygium Cascade)



Grows to approx. 4 metres max high. A decorative compact shrub with flowing 'cascades' of drooping red new growth changing through shades of pink to green. Produces clusters of flowers in spring followed by red edible fruits.
Uses – HEDGE, SCREEN, MAINTAIN AS SHRUB/ BRUSH

Small leaf Lilly Pilly (Syzygium luehmannii)



Grows to approx. 7m max x. A decorative compact medium tree with foliage to ground level. Small white flowers, followed by fleshy red berries. New glossy green leaves are pink/red when young.
Uses – SCREEN, HEDGE, OR SPECIMEN TREE
